#### Refugee's Germany - Germany at a glance

The lecture series provides a comprehensive overview of the present Germany focusing in the areas of culture (history, religion, education and culture), everyday life as well as society and politics. The objective is to provide an action-oriented overview knowledge in everyday communication situations, but also in the use of media, while attempting to prepare the participants for a scientific training in Germany.

The individual lessons are structured so that (1) the basic knowledge on a common standard is linked up with (2) indepth case studies. For this purpose, additional guest speakers may be invited in individual sessions (2a) that fully explain a certain question. Therefore the members of the Institute for research of Germany will be asked for their contribution. (2b) As an alternative or (3) as a further supplement short basic texts (provided in English and German) are included, in which the subject will be brought to the point. Each lesson is divided into several sections, whereas in each case systematical (4) questions regarding certain intermediate steps are possible. As a final backup of results of each lesson (5) a thesis-like summary will be provided, which will be designed in the form of a short test or a mini quiz.

All lessons are supported by a rather brief Power Point presentation, further by in-depth texts and summaries. Music recordings, film clips and art reproductions are of course available. As a result, the participants may expect not a handbook but rather a kaleidoscope of the German present age.

The lessons attempt to arouse joy and interest in Germany, encouraging curiosity and independent inquiries, and in this way they will also give an integrative impulse. The core concept is seeking to integrate the knowleddge of participants and to take prejudices as a provocation for questions. Even if a relatively heterogeneous group must be assumed, the participants are expected to be highly engaged, eager to learn and to take part voluntarily.

#### **Institute for German Cultural Studies**

The Institute for German Cultural Studies (IDF) is an interdisciplinary platform supported by a group of humanists, cultural and social scientists, who have been observing and researching diverse phenomena related to the German division and to the German Democratic Republic (GDR) with comparative methods. The IDF is placing its main emphasis on political and structural changes in East and West Germany and in Europe. Different projects concerning the internal migration and the cultural history of Germany were carried out within this framework. Due to the new international and European focus of its research and teaching activities the IDF has been defined as an established interdisciplinary working group for German and European Cultural Studies at the Ruhr-University Bochum since 2012. It focuses mainly on investigating and analyzing the present age and the history of Germany within the European Community since the second half of the 20th century. Lectures, excursions, research projects and studies take place in the fields of politics, law, society, culture and science.






